

This year has reminded us in so many ways of the strength and closeness of our community. Even in the months in which we were physically distant and unable to gather in person, the Holy Spirit and our Faith kept us together, connecting us. Many in the media or in our society kept referring to our churches as “closed,” but we were never closed — we continued following the Gospel call to live in love with our neighbors, finding ever new ways to seek and serve Christ in all people.

We want to share what we have accomplished this year at Middleham and St. Peter’s. In July of last year, 2019 we entered into a transition phase in our church. We secured an Interim Rector, Pastor Linda Kapurch, who helped us smoothly continue to do what we do best, support our many ministries, provide pastoral care for our parishioners and maintain our worship opportunities at the three separate locations. We commissioned a Profile Committee, which successfully completed a parish profile in record

time so that by the end of 2019 we were ready to have our Search Committee take on the task of finding us a new rector. Just after the New Year, the Search Committee was commissioned by the Vestry to present up to three candidates by June 1, 2020. Guided by the Holy Spirit the Search Committee presented one candidate to the Vestry for consideration and by the beginning of July the Vestry prayerfully considered the candidate and determined unanimously that Father Nathan Beall was the best fit for us and called him to be our new rector.

Hiring a new rector to guide us in leadership and work with us in collaboration to move forward towards a future with great hope for our parish was not the only thing we did this year, although that was a genuinely remarkable feat considering the circumstances that befell this country in March. Undaunted by the onslaught of COVID-19 and the ripple effect of its grasp, we at Middleham and St. Peter's stepped up to make sure the people in our parish and others that we serve through our generosity and ministries were well taken care of spiritually, faithfully and practically.

We initiated online virtual worship opportunities that included a live-streamed service and zoom offerings so that we were able to stay connected. When health officials modified restrictions for religious organizations to worship together we began to worship outside, continuing to wear masks and maintain social distancing. Now that we have moved inside to happily worship together in Smith Hall we will continue to implement safety regulations and health directives so everyone will stay healthy.

We continued our outreach ministries with the Food Drop (drivers are always needed) and the HeartFELT backpack program resumed deliveries at the end of September. We moved forward with plans to hold a stay-in-your-car-drive-around-the-circle Health Fair and we successfully and virtually held the Big Conversation that reached over 300 people in the community discussing health care inequity. Our inreach ministries continued as volunteers, including many youth, helped with household repairs needed by parishioners. We built a Labyrinth that is bringing joy to so many who have walked the circle in this stressful time and will continue to be a spiritual haven in the future. These are only a few of the many examples in which our generosity of spirit and strength was clear this year.

As we look to the year to come, we are more committed than ever to the ministry and love we share with our community and our neighbors. Our ministry is funded through the gifts of its members — your generous offerings given in grace and love. This year we are asking for every member to take part in our stewardship campaign by making a pledge. Included with this letter are materials for making your gift. It is especially important that you pledge your support this year as we continue to have operating expenses. We were also unable to hold any of our fundraisers, May Fest, the Annual Spring Dinner and Holidays in church that often generate much needed funds.

Rather than holding a full joint service at the beginning and the end of the stewardship campaign, we will instead be hearing messages of Faith-Filled Generosity as we move through the weeks of this year's stewardship season through short videos which will be shared with the congregation during the month of October. We will see how our faith kindles our love for each other and our Christian responsibility to share generously to support our church. I invite you and your household to pray and reflect on the importance of your church, taking these weeks to consider how your generous response to God's call is shaped by this community and the friends who gather with you. Thank you for being a part of the Middleham and St. Peter's family and for your faithful, faith-filled gift to our annual campaign.

Fr. Nathan Beall's Reflection

St. Francis

October 4, which this year falls on a Sunday, marks the Feast of St. Francis, sometimes known as the “most celebrated and least imitated” saint of the Church. Many of us have seen the images of St. Francis surrounded by animals or holding birds, or the small image of him watching over our columbarium. Some may know that St. Francis began the tradition of the “Nativity scene” by gathering animals around a crib on Christmas Eve. Fewer people probably realize that St. Francis dedicated himself to a life of poverty so radical that he ripped tiles off of the roof when people tried to build him a house, or that he identified so deeply with the crucified Christ that he received physical wounds in his body. Like Jesus, St. Francis comes to us in forms both strange and familiar. The images on the surface of the Franciscan tradition draw us into a deeper well, one that draws its source from the love of God.

Born in 1182 to a prosperous merchant in Assisi, Italy, the man who would become St. Francis initially led a life of pleasure and ambition. He chased women and money as a youth, and then sought glory on the battlefield as a knight. He failed. War wounded his body and his mind, and he took months to recover. During that time, God reached into his soul to begin drawing young Francis to Himself. He experienced a number of “conversion” moments, but one of the earliest came when he encountered a leper, someone with a contagious disease whom he had been told to fear and reject. Francis realized that Christ was present in the poor and the outcast, so he dedicated himself to a life of voluntary poverty, and cast himself out of society--for a short time--as a hermit. While praying in a ruined church building for direction from God, he looked upon an ancient crucifix and heard the voice of Jesus say to him, “Francis, rebuild my Church, which as you can see, is falling into ruin.” Francis followed the letter and the spirit of this command by placing stone upon stone to rebuild the ruined chapel of San Damiano, which one can

still see today just outside Assisi. But he would later realize that he was called not only to rebuild this church, but *the* Church, through his preaching and his life. Soon, other men joined him to form a small religious brotherhood who lived in poverty, prayed, and preached the gospel to anyone who would listen (even birds). They had no plan but Jesus.

St. Francis' fame and his brotherhood grew, and the Franciscans brought the good news of Christ and their simple way of life around the globe. Meanwhile, Francis struggled with the tensions between directing a massive religious order, maintaining his commitment to poverty, and finding enough time for prayer and contemplation. One night, as he prayed on a mountain to identify more deeply with the crucified Christ, a six-winged angel appeared to him, spoke to him words that he could not repeat, and implanted in his body five wounds to match those of his Lord. He carried these wounds for the remaining two years of his life. Although he sought to hide them, they were discovered by his brothers, and became the source of miraculous healing for many. St. Francis died with his body on the bare earth on the evening of October 3rd, 1226, and bells in Assisi rang of their own accord.

Sacred stories about St. Francis abound- some comical, some tragic, some bizarre. I encourage you to look to them for your own edification. Bonaventure's *Life of St. Francis* is a good place to start. The life and times of St. Francis seem strange and inimitable to us at first, but they are not so distant as they seem. They remind us that violence, contagious disease, and abandoned church buildings are nothing new to God or to His Church. They have happened before, and they have produced saints. How does the life and message of St. Francis speak to you? How does Jesus call you to rebuild His Church?

A Page Out Of History - Restoring St. Peter's Chapel

Part of the fun of being Junior Warden is learning the history of the Chapels in the course of doing repairs. This was particularly true as we worked through the restoration of St. Peter's. Damaged by a storm in April, we began the repairs in late August and completed them in September. Approximately \$90,000 was spent in repairs, which were completed by highly qualified craftsman. This is a little of what was learned during the project.

Repairs were made to the exterior using similar materials as were used during original construction. We used the Amish to mill the wood pieces used to repair siding, batten boards and base materials. The entire building was painted inside and out, including the bell tower.

Like Middleham, I had to make the trip to the bell tower and inspect the bell. Here's what I learned. The bell was made by the McShane Bell Foundry in Baltimore. Since the conception of the company in 1856, McShane Bell Foundry has been producing America's finest Church Bells, Ring Peal, Chimes and Carillons the world has ever heard. St Peter's is one of over 300,000 McShane church bells ringing out from the towers of Cathedrals, Churches, Municipal Buildings, Universities and schools every day, all over the world.

Organ work was completed by Lewis and Hitchcock, a company established by Theodore C. Lewis & William I. Hitchcock in 1915 after they installed an E.M. Skinner Pipe Organ in the Bethlehem Chapel of the Washington National Cathedral. Lewis & Hitchcock continued that American Classic Organ tradition in Washington, D.C. and in 1937 installed the organ currently in use at the Scottish Rite Building. At St. Peter's they removed all the pipes and transported them to Smith Hall for safe keeping while

construction was underway. During the course of removing the pipes they noted that two pipes were missing, and the dulcimer box was in need of extensive repairs. New pipes were constructed by one of the few craftsmen still in the business. These new pipes and the dulcimer box were reinstalled along with the other pipes and a complete tuning was done.

The roof was replaced by Lincoln Roofing of Mechanicsville. This is the same company that replaced the roof on Middleham Chapel. When you visit St. Peter's, note the craftsmanship of the roof and the copper trim. This roof, like that at Middleham, was done using more modern materials which allow the shingles to breath better prolonging their life.

During the removal of the old roof, original shingles were found under layers of repairs. The metal shingles are thought to be made by Follansbee Steel. Follansbee Steel is the successor to a business which was formed in the early 1800's. This company, owned by a James Park, produced block tin, ingot copper, antimony, sheet zinc, sheet iron and tin plate. The tin-plated sheet manufactured by Park and used on a roof came to be known by a name which today is still used by many in the roofing industry - the "old tin roof." This business was later owned by a James P. Scott and then by two brothers who worked in the Scott plant, John and Robert Follansbee. When the demand for tin plate increased significantly because of its durability as a roofing metal, the Follansbee brothers sensed the need for expanded facilities and moved the plant to its present site in 1902. The city of Follansbee, West Virginia was created by the families of those who worked in the plant.

A rededication ceremony was held on Saturday, September 26, 2020 at St. Peter's Chapel. Parishioners and guests gathered for a brief ceremony / blessing followed by small group tours of the building.

Voting is your civic duty. It is a right you have to make your voice heard. It is your responsibility. It is your way of making a difference. Every vote counts. The 2020 election is going to be different than any election in American history. There are several ways to vote this year:

1. Register to vote

Step one is the same regardless of whether you want to vote in-person on Election Day or early or whether you want to vote by mail. You need to get registered. You cannot vote in any way without being on the rolls.

2. How to vote by MAIL

Applications to request a mail-in ballot in Maryland are automatically sent to registered voters. **YOU HAVE TO REQUEST A MAIL-IN BALLOT.** If you want to vote by mail you need to follow the direction on the application and mail it in before October 20, 2020 **BUT** request it sooner than waiting for the deadline. Once you receive your actual Ballot in the mail – **FILL IT OUT AND MAIL IT BACK.**

3. How to vote IN PERSON

There are **TWO** ways to vote in person:

EARLY VOTING - Go in person to Calvert County Community Resources Building 30 Duke Street – Lower Level Prince Frederick, MD 20678 (Across from the Prince Frederick Post Office - Old Library Building) (This is the only place to vote early in Calvert County).

Early Voting will be available from Monday, October 26 through Monday, November 2 (including Saturday and Sunday) from 7am to 8 pm

ELECTION DAY VOTING -Go to your designated polling place on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. Sites are still being determined. You will be notified as soon as they are official.

Re-Gathering Inside

Having “church” during the past few months in the midst of a pandemic has been challenging and nothing like “church” was prior to COVID-19 entering our lives. That said, we at Middleham and St. Peter’s have faced this challenge with new, innovative ways and attempted to make sure all of the parishioners have had their worship needs met.

When our buildings closed we opened our online worship options beginning with a collaboration with Rev. Greg Syler and Ascension, Lexington Park and St. George’s, Valley Lee to zoom a morning prayer at 10 am on Sunday mornings. We also provided links to the Cathedral of the Incarnation in Baltimore and the National Cathedral in Washington, DC for live-streamed services also on Sunday mornings. All of these options were available for viewing in recorded form at a later time.

With the information gathered from the Caring Network callers, it was determined that people missed their home church. The 8:30 am Eucharist Service on Sunday morning live-streamed on Facebook from Smith Hall was developed to meet that need. A recorded version of this service is available and archived on our YouTube channel.

This online service option will continue for the foreseeable future regardless of when we re-gather in person on site outside or inside.

On July 12 we initiated an onsite outside Sunday Morning 8:30am Eucharistic service in front of Smith Hall, practicing social distancing, wearing masks and following other strict rules to ensure the safety of our congregation. We also offered a “stay in your car” alternative with access to the service via our FM radio channel.

We opened our doors September 20th. We are offering an onsite 8:30 am and an 11:00 am Sunday Morning Eucharist service **inside** Smith Hall. While Governor Hogan has moved the state of Maryland into Phase 3 of reopening, allowing churches to move from 50% to 75% capacity, we are going to proceed with more caution here at Middleham and St. Peter’s. Because the chapels do not lend themselves for adequate social distancing we are only going to hold inside services in Smith Hall for the time being.

Here is our plan for holding safe, social distanced gatherings inside Smith Hall:

1. Masks are required to be worn by everyone at all times.
2. There will be ushers directing seating. Please do not move the chairs.
3. Singing will be limited ONLY to Beth Lanier at the keyboard.
3. Communion (wafers only administered by tongs) will be offered as directed by ushers.
4. No coffee hour / food / drink will be offered.
5. Bathrooms will be available upon request, but must be sanitized by user with cleaning supplies provided prior to exiting.
6. A paper and online Service Bulletin will be available.

7. Non-contact temperature taking measures will be administered to onsite participants upon entering.
8. When the service is over please exit the building immediately as directed by the ushers.
9. Fellowship / small group gathering will be at the discretion of participants maintaining social distancing outside after the service.
10. PLEASE STAY HOME IF YOU ARE NOT COMFORTABLE VENTURING OUT JUST YET (online services are still available and the 8:30 am service will continue to be live-streamed) OR ESPECIALLY IF YOU ARE SICK.

Please note: EACH WEEK prior to Sunday you will need to call the office – 410-326-4948 to make a reservation to attend either the 8:30 am or the 11:00 am service, no later than Friday by This will allow us to prepare the space with chairs set up at a safe distance and determine who and how many will be attending each service. We will limit the attendance to 35 people for each service at this time. (The space will be sanitized between services).

Hopefully this attempt to Re-Gather will go smoothly and be an enjoyable experience for all. As the fall and winter progress we will continue to re-evaluate our worship options in the hopes that the parishioners of Middleham and St. Peter's will continue to be able to worship well and safely, either in person or online.

As always, stay safe, stay well and stay home if you are sick.

The Big Conversation VIII - Many Wounds to Heal: Health Care (In)Equity - How Does It Affect Me?
 Sunday September 13



Over 210 people joined the Big Conversation by Zoom to explore health care inequities on Sunday September 13. This eighth Big Conversation concerned dismantling racism in our community with a focus on disparities in healthcare. It's purpose is to increase awareness of longstanding systemic problems of bias/racism in healthcare and to identify opportunities for more equitable delivery of healthcare in our community. This event represented well over a year of preparation by The Big Conversation Steering Committee which includes:

The panel was followed by all attendees joining 13 one hour small group discussions where attendees had the opportunity to reflect on the panel presentation, to share from their own life experiences and suggest ways to address the inequity issues and bias on an individual and the systemic levels. A roundtable discussion of small group findings followed. Participants were also asked to complete a survey in order to identify further possible actions. The steering committee will consolidate all of these sources these into an executive summary and proposed actions to be shared with the Southern Maryland community next month.

This event received extraordinary support from two partners – the Calvert Library provided the Zoom capacity through its representative Robin Truslow and staff,. The Mediation Centers from Calvert, St. Mary's, and Charles Counties and beyond, provided the facilitators for the small groups.



Choirs and Singing in the Age of COVID-19

Wednesday, October 7

3:00pm EDT

At the start of the pandemic, there was much concern that singing, particularly choral singing, could be a major risk in the transmission of COVID-19, as was reported widely in the press. As a result, there has been much caution in the process of reopening our choirs. Before the pandemic, there had been little study into the production of aerosols with regard to singing, and in the past few months studies have taken place, the most significant of which is the PERFORM trial on behalf of the British government. We are honored to welcome Declan Costello of the PERFORM trial to this webinar. Mr Costello is a Consultant Ear, Nose & Throat Surgeon and professional singer and he will explain the findings of the study. Our panel will explore how an evidence based return to choral singing might look, and how best to assess and mitigate potential risks of returning.

On September 14, the Executive Council of the National Episcopal Church announced a grant in the amount of \$5000 to Middleham and St. Peter’s Parish. This is a **Becoming a Beloved Community Grant** for the **Big Conversation Partners in Dismantling Racism and Privilege in Southern Maryland**. This grant was awarded from among the 94 applicants for work in addressing the racial disparities laid bare by the coronavirus pandemic.

This grant will help to support the work of Middleham and St. Peter’s Big Conversation initiative and its partners in preparing for and holding the Big Conversation and the follow up activities undertaken during the next year. Full detail on the current Big Conversation event is in another article in this edition.

The following is a summary of our grant request:

Middleham and St. Peter’s Parish requests grant support for our project the Big Conversation Partners for Dismantling Racism and Privilege in Southern Maryland. This project is intended to identify and uproot racism in health care both personally and in the institutions that perpetuate and benefit from racism across the three counties. Starting with extended study and interviews, the project will then convene health care providers and diverse residents in a “Big Conversation” to identify racism in health care and propose responses. Using those responses, the project will carry out a series of activities to further inform the community and address the racism. The Covid 19 pandemic has highlighted racism in health through the disparate impact on black and brown communities, both nationally and in Southern Maryland. This project is about addressing those disparate impacts. The twenty-two partners are key in that they enable the project to reach out broadly into region. Middleham and St. Peter’s and its partners are experienced in this approach, having carried out community conversations since 2012 and specifically on race since 2016.

What does it mean to Become a Beloved Community?

As the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement, those in the movement dream and work to foster Beloved Communities where all people may experience dignity and abundant life and see themselves and others as beloved children of God. Becoming the Beloved Community involves the long-term commitments necessary to form loving, liberating and life-giving relationships with each other. Together, we are growing as reconcilers, justice-makers and healers in the name of Christ. It is reflected in the cry of the prophet Micah, “O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and walk humbly with your God”. 

Friends of the Haiti School Nurse Project Newsletter

September 2020

We are pleased to report that schools have started for the fall semester in Haiti, including our three schools in Leogane. Haiti along with the rest of the world has struggled with the pandemic. After school disruptions in the last school year due to Covid 19 and political unrest, we are looking forward to a more stable third year.

Dean Alcindor reported to us that she and the school nurses had met with the directors of the schools to lay out plans for the new academic year. Each of the schools expressed the advantages of the program and their overall satisfaction.

- ❖ Ecole Sainte Croix was represented by Reverend Yves Seme. This is an Episcopal School and Father Seme is an Episcopal priest. Remember that the Diocese of Haiti is part of the Episcopal Church USA, so Father Seme is a priest just like Middleham and St. Peter's Father Beall and Father Steiner.
- ❖ Ecole Sainte Rose of Lima was represented by one of the teachers, as the director was not available. Alin Theveni, a male nurse, will be serving this school.
- ❖ Institut Abellard was represented by Mme Gabrielle Abellard, the CEO of the school.

The nurses will be present at the schools Monday through Thursday for two to three hours a day, and available after hours by telephone. Each of the school nurses will coordinate and direct the work of FSIL student nurses who will provide support and gain practical experience at the schools.

Dean Alcindor reported that the following services will be provided this year:

- ❖ Physical exam including visual acuity and audiology testing
- ❖ Checking on vaccination. All students will be vaccinated eventually.
- ❖ Monthly meeting with the directors of the schools.
- ❖ Quarterly meeting with the parents.
- ❖ Education on health promotion for the staff of the schools, the parents, and the students.

An Extraordinary Effort at the Nursing School

When the pandemic closed schools and universities in March across Haiti and around the world, FSIL under the leadership of Dean Alcindor chose to “take a step forward instead of a step back.” As reported in the Haiti Nursing Foundation summer newsletter (see <https://www.haitinursing.org/news>), FSIL’s IT manager Henry Michel Jean-Baptiste created an online platform for a learning management system enabling the 120 nursing students to continue their studies. As noted in the article, four Zoom classrooms were purchased, and studies continued for both students, instructors, and administrators. As indicated in the article, “Despite Haiti’s common internet and electricity availability challenges, the online learning experience was an overwhelmingly positive one.” FSIL was one of the very few institutions in the country to remain operating.

We are extremely fortunate to have FSIL through which we may help bring health care to the children in Leogane. Please consider continuing and expanding your financial support for this extraordinary program.



