While it is important to intentionally focus on when, how and what you can give to the church, let's also talk about something definitely related to stewardship, but maybe even more significant; how you have been influenced by God's generosity. Everything we have at Middleham and St. Peter's and in our own lives is the result of God's generosity. In turn we should do everything we can to reciprocate and "repay" God, so to speak. There are many ways we can do that. Let's start with a few questions to ask ourselves.

How can we fulfill the mission and vision that God has for us and for our church? If we look back on the last 18 months there are so many ways, we at Middleham and St. Peter's have met the challenges of this year and a half and found ways to share our community of love and joy with others. THANK YOU! All of you!

The stewardship theme this year is Every Perfect Gift. Every one of us has gifts to share and we so generously offer them not only to our church, but also to our community and to each other in many ways. Giving to the church is not just about paying the bills and keeping the lights on. It's about acknowledging a calling to serve and help others that goes beyond our church walls and into the community and then into the world. It means that we set aside our sense of ownership and possession and realize that everything we have, everything that our congregation has, has just been entrusted to us to be used not for our own purposes, but for God's purpose. While the operating budget needs to cover the recurring and predictable expenses, what people give extends so much farther than that.

Our mission at Middleham and St. Peter's Parish is to be a welcoming, engaging and spiritual community of worship, fellowship, and service for all, providing an open door to all who reach out to God.

Our vision at Middleham and St. Peter's Parish is:

- To seek to provide a spiritual home for those who want to celebrate God's love, participate in joyful worship and fellowship and humbly serve those in need, near and far;
- ❖ To strive to love, nurture and support one another in all stages of life through prayer, education, pastoral care, and outreach;
- ❖ To encourage all to know Christ and in turn make Him known to others as we reach out through our gifts of time, talents and treasure;
- ❖ To embrace Jesus' commitment to the poor and marginalized, and through outreach to serve them;
- ❖ To seek a shared commitment to and love for God's wonderfully diverse Creation, without the usual human constraints of hospitality based on race, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or religious beliefs;
- ❖ To increase our Christian family by providing diverse services, programs and ministries that will meet the needs and aspirations of all generations in our parish and in the community; and
- ❖ To be inspired by God and believing all is possible with God's help.

Another question to consider is what does "giving" to the church actually mean? According to Lynn A. Miller, "Stewardship is the act of organizing your life so that God can spend you." This quote captures beautifully what Biblical stewardship is all about. It's about giving of ourselves, and all we have, in a way that leaves no doubt about where our priorities are. I believe that in order to truly be good stewards, our stewardship must be intentional. We must begin with God, and find ways to fit our lives to Him, rather than fitting God into the rest of our lives. Pause and consider for a minute all of the many blessings God has given you. How are you giving those blessings back to Him? God has blessed us all so plentifully. It is our duty as Christians to look for ways to use those blessings to serve God. There is no such thing as a talent, length of time or a treasure that is so small or insignificant, that it cannot be used to serve God and our church.

How can we give? The people of Middleham and St. Peter's are givers. We give our time, treasure and talent to the church and the community every day. This year has been so different from other years in terms of what has been asked of us as individuals and as a community. So many have stepped up to find ways to reach our parishioners and meet their spiritual, physical and material needs. Generosity is the perfect gift. We show that in everything we do at Middleham and St. Peter's. You all are generous people and for that we are immensely grateful. That spills over into all that we do here. We make a difference. In order for that to continue we need you to pledge your support in any way you can. It is vital to the life of our church, and it is sincerely appreciated.

Thoughts From The Rector

Stewardship

It is hard to believe, but stewardship season is nigh upon us. Also at this time of year, we celebrate two saints about whom I have previously written in newsletters and spoken about in sermons: St. Therese of Lisieux (October 1) and St. Francis of Assisi (October 4). These two saints, both committed to a life of poverty in community, teach us an important truth about stewardship: it is different from ownership. I am afraid that American society today places a great deal of importance on the latter, and not much on the former. We define ourselves and our station in life by the things we own: first car, first house, etc. The things we own are now often built to be obsolete, and we throw them away or sell them so that we can purchase something newer and better. Ownership thus often has more to do with status than with care or compassion. St. Therese and St. Francis, by contrast, became who they were by renouncing everything and holding possessions only in community. St. Francis was sometimes rebuked by his brothers for giving away the brown sack that served as his only possession and article of clothing. But he told them that everything we have is given to us as a loan until someone poorer needs it. That teaching defines stewardship: taking care of what we are given for the sake of someone else.

This is what we strive to practice in the church, with our time, our talent, and our treasure. How would we spend our time differently if we considered it to be God's time, and not ours? Would we spend more time with our families? Would we spend more time serving at church or in the neighborhood? What if we considered our skills and education to be not ours, but gifts from God for the sake of others? Would we have less desire to "own" a ministry, and more of a desire to

carry it out and pass it on to someone else? What about our treasure? How would we give of our money if we did not consider it to be ours in the first place?

The second truth about stewardship that these saints teach us is that stewardship means caring for creation. St. Therese always saw the beauty of God in flowers, and described herself as a little flower in God's garden. St. Francis preached among the birds, and gathered animals together in a barn to teach the story of the Jesus' birth at the first Nativity scene in Greccio. Both saints remind us that we learn the goodness of the Creator from His creation, of which we are a part. In what is sometimes considered the first poem written in Italian, St. Francis praised God through every aspect of creation, beginning with the words, "Be praised my Lord, through Brother Sun." (The rest of the text can be found below.) What if we looked at the land around our house and church, and the waters around our county, not as resources to be used, but as parts of our family? How might we eat differently, transport ourselves differently, or care for the landscape differently?

I hope and pray for us to keep these two saints and these two truths in mind as we consider what we will give or pledge this season in the life of our church. What has God given you in terms of time, talent, and treasure? How might you give that to others so as to be good stewards of our church, and of our earth? Please let me know if you would like to talk or pray as you discern these questions. I have learned much from you about stewardship over the past year, and I look forward to learning more from your conversation and example.

MIDDLEHAM CHAPEL PROJECT

One afternoon during the pandemic Father Nathan and I got into a discussion about the history of Middleham Chapel. We talked about work that had previously been done in the building and the work still needing to be done. One item was the carpeting and what it would take to have it replaced. Several years before we had received an estimate of approximately \$5,000 to have it replaced. It had been in the building longer than most could remember. We also discussed the historical significance of the building, it's registry as a historic landmark and of course Elizabeth (Elizabeth is a story for another day).

Following the discussion, we went to the chapel with the intent of pulling up a little piece to see what was underneath and to determine the condition of the floor. We pulled up a corner and were amazed at what we saw so we pulled up a little more. As you can see by the photo, we got a little carried away and took it all up! And, along the way we found a friend under the carpet. (very much deceased)



The next step was to find someone to refinish the floors. We chose Well's flooring from Huntingtown, a family-owned business for several generations and one that others in the congregation have used. The estimate was less than recarpeting and more in keeping with the history of the Chapel. While these floors came much after the Chapel was built, they more accurately reflect what it might have looked like in 1748.

When the pews were being removed to refinish the floors, we turned them over and discovered they were hand sawn with hand cut nails holding them together. The nails were dated back to between 1680 and 1730 which was around the time the original Chapel was built. Nails were a scarce commodity during that period and It could be concluded that the some of the nails were probably from the original Chapel, if not all of them. The scarcity of nails in colonies led Virginia to the enactment of a statute in 1645 prohibiting settlers from burning down old building for their nails. Most nails during this period had to be imported and were quite expensive.

Some minor restoration work was done on the pews to tighten them and cover the scratches with wood stain that match original color. Note that the pews have a crackle finish which is consistent with a shellac that was used during a previous restoration.

Lastly, the large organ speakers were replaced with much smaller ones and relocated to the top of the walls in the rear of the church.

It never ceases to amaze me what you find during these projects. The nails and their history are in a shadow box in the back of the Chapel. Thanks to everyone who helped me with this project.

Middleham Responds to the Earthquake and Hurricane in Haiti

Our Haiti team here at Middleham and St. Peter's was in touch with our partners at the Nursing School in Leogane shortly after the disastrous August 10 earthquake. In conversation with Dean Hilda Alcindor, she indicated that they would be responding with a team going into the epicenter of the earthquake, but they needed funds. Father Nathan was on the call, and he decided that there would be a special offering at his welcoming service on September 12. Our parish responded generously, with \$3000 sent through our stateside partner, the Haiti Nursing Foundation, directly to support the teams. The school sent a team of doctors, nurses and student nurses which initially provided health care, food, and clothing for well over 300 individuals – see the picture below. Just a week later they sent a second team, and with our support and HNF, they will be sending as many as eight more relief teams.

Nation in Crisis: Haiti Today

Tuesday, October 5 3:00pm EDT **Register Here**

About this event

The people of Haiti are experiencing an unprecedented humanitarian crisis. Those watching or reading our international news will be familiar with the challenges this Caribbean nation has faced over the last decades. From extreme food insecurity, increasing COVID infection rates, violent political unrest, and devastation and damage from earthquakes, Haitians face challenges many of us can't imagine.

During this workshop, our panel will share with you about these ongoing challenges and how you can help the Haitian people in this moment. We will hear from our ministry partners at Food for the Poor about their work in Haiti. Bishop Oge Beauvoir, Executive Director of Food For The Poor in Haiti, will provide an overview of the crises and steps Food for the Poor, the largest NGO in Haiti, is taking to help the nation.

The panel will also have representatives from St. Vincent's Center for Children with Disabilities in Haiti (SVC). SVC was founded in 1945 by Sister Joan Margaret, a physical therapist with the Episcopal order of the Sisters of St. Margaret. Today SVC is a tri-partite ministry: a school for 200 children who are deaf and/or blind and/or in wheelchairs; a downtown Port-au-Prince Medical Clinic - staffed by five orthopedic surgeons, five pediatricians, an ophthalmologist, a psychologist, and a Brace Shop making prosthetics and braces for the poorest of the poor. Representatives from SVC will share how the ministry continues working during the crisis, often in conjunction with Food for the Poor.

SEAFARERS CHRISTMAS

2021: Building on Our 2020 Miracle!

In 2020, the Baltimore International Seafarers' Center changed our Christmas at Sea gift instructions, to make gifts easier to handle while the pandemic limited available personnel.

And every single one of you followed our new guidelines! On top of all the other challenges of 2020, this careful attention to lonely seafarers was a true Christmas miracle. Thank you!

We're using the same guidelines this year because they worked so well. If you're new to Christmas at Sea, or need a refresher:



Please put items in one-gallon sealed plastic bags* (not boxes). Seal tightly, without over-stuffing. 25 moderately full bags are better than 20 bursting open.



NO FOOD, not even gum, because the smell is overpowering in warm storage rooms.

Please include a paperback New Testament in modern English if possible. (Hardbacks weigh too much. King James is difficult for many foreign seafarers.) Groups whose workplaces don't allow Bibles to be purchased could include an uplifting calendar.

A WARM HAT is the other most popular item.

Then add <u>some</u> of the following, depending on budget and space: warm gloves or warm socks, hand warmers, pad and pen, post cards or magnets of Baltimore or D.C., flash drive, <u>small sealed</u> gender-neutral toiletries. Large bottles weigh too much! Combs, toothbrushes, etc. should be <u>individually sealed</u> in <u>original packaging</u>, for the reassurance of seafarers.

Options to make your gift more festive: you could sign a Christmas card and insert so the picture shows through the bag, or line the bag with colored tissue, or put Christmas stickers on the outside. Please, no bulky bows, as they'll be crushed.

Carolyn Steiner is asking MSP to collect plastic bags (grocery, cleaner, bread, newspaper, etc) for a project she is doing for Benjamin Banneker Elementary School. This is where she worked as a Physical Therapist for a number of years, and now does substitute work. Her family and high school friends have donated money as a start up for a butterfly garden for her 70th birthday. TREX, the deck board company, has a program that if you collect 500 pounds of plastic over a 6-month period they will give you a TREX bench for free. If you collect as a school you have to compete with the whole mid-Atlantic area, but if you are a nonprofit, you just have to collect the 500 pounds and you get a bench.

So, MSP said she could collect in their name, but have the first benches go to Benjamin Banneker Elementary School, and when they have some, we can get some for MSP. These benches require no maintenance and are perfect around butterfly gardens, labyrinths, vegetable gardens, and churches.




The Southern Maryland JobSource Mobile Career Center




The Bookmobile will be making monthly stops throughout the county...bringing a mini-library experience.


