SEPTEMBER 2019 Coffee Filters

I am a tea drinker, but I make coffee for my husband each day and I recently ran out of coffee filters. I still make coffee the old-fashioned way in our house, using a Mr. Coffee maker, pouring in the water, adding coffee grounds to the filter, and waiting for it to trickle down into the glass pot. Fresh coffee aroma fills the kitchen. It smells delicious. I don't set a timer



for the coffee to magically start on it's own. There is some satisfaction that comes from the manual labor and the step by step task to create a final product. There are also some mornings when that feels impractical, yet I still don't use a Keurig, ignoring the convenience of individual cups and the rapid result of almost instant coffee. Technically water still has to be added, but not as much, as well as the individual containers with seemingly endless choices of coffee types.

I remember back in my parents' day, making coffee required a real metal coffee pot full of water, a metal screen filter lid that fit over a perforated metal basket that held the coffee grounds which was held together by a long metal rod. This "percolator" was placed on the stove and eventually coffee was brewed. The pot had a small glass

dome in the center of the lid through which you could see the coffee bubble when it was ready. Of course, the quickest way to make coffee is to use instant or freeze dried in a cup of water and a microwave. We have come a long way in the coffee brewing business. It is important to remember, though, that however you brew it or whatever you use to make it, it's still coffee.

Well, I was able to find some coffee filters in the supermarket, but they were different in color, texture and packaging. I knew they would work, at least for the short term, but I wasn't sure for the long term. I realized, then, that I might have to entertain some other options for making coffee in the future. Something more modern, more practical, more appropriate for our needs.

So what does this have to do with church exactly? Just as there are many ways to make coffee, there are many options for how we "do church" and who we should be looking for as a new rector, taking into consideration what our church needs now and for the future. For the interim, we will probably be happy with someone who is similar to our retiring rector, but like changing coffee filters, he or she will most likely be somewhat different. The Interim Rector will allow us to keep functioning and meeting our current needs as we take the time to evaluate what we will need in a new, permanent rector.

For that we should consider a person who has qualities and characteristics that embrace our traditions, but who also exhibits the ability and desire to move us forward and grow our congregation. We will always be an Episcopal church, but how we do it and what





we use to do it could and maybe should be different. We will have to ask ourselves some

tough questions in this transition time. Are three worship services every Sunday sustainable? Can one rector realistically be capable of doing three services every Sunday? Do we need more than one rector to meet our pastoral and worship needs? Can we afford it? What are our strengths and

weaknesses as a parish community? These and many other questions need to be asked and we will find the answers. The Profile Committee, which is currently being formed, will give all of us an opportunity to share our thoughts about who we are and where we want to go. When you are asked to participate in this process, step up to the plate. This transition time will allow us to evaluate what we have here at MSP, try some new things, I hear the groans and cheers already, and envision what a future at MSP could look like. We have to be open to all possibilities and challenge ourselves to do what is right for our future. We have a clean slate. Let's fill it up with ideas, hopes and needs. May the Holy Spirit be with us!

An Update on Planned Giving and the Endowment at Middleham and St. Peter's



Fifteen years ago, our church initiated a planned giving program and established our endowment. As part of that, we also established a legacy society – The 1684 Society – to recognize and thank those people who made a planned gift to the parish. This article provides an update for you on each of these.

<u>An updated set of policies and guidelines</u> have been developed and approved by the vestry. Included are the enabling resolution setting forth the basic ground rules and the policies for the administration of the endowment. These are based on the recommendations of the Episcopal Church Foundation. Policies include how funds are to be invested and rules regarding how endowment funds may be drawn down and spent.

<u>A new committee</u> has been established to oversee the investment and monitor the distributions to insure adherence to the new policies. The committee includes a minimum of three members, plus the rector and wardens are ex-officio members. The initial three members are Hugh Davies, Steve Lyle, and Jim Shepherd. The committee also encourages contributions to the endowment through planned gifts, memorials and other sources.

<u>Status of the endowment</u> – the current value of the endowment at the end of the second quarter was just over \$400,000. The committee prudently oversees the investment of the endowment through UBS and its financial managers Don Chomas and Russell Rifkin.

<u>Use of endowment funds</u> – in accordance with the new policies, distributions of endowment funds are limited to capital improvements, ministries and grants, seed money for new ministries and special one-time projects, and such other purposes that are specifically designated by donors whose gifts are included in the fund. Fund distributions are not to be made to the operating budget, except within the purposes named above.

Currently, endowment funds are being made available through the endowment grant process. The deadline for submission of a grant request was August 15. Grants will be announced shortly.

<u>Supporting the endowment</u> is truly supporting the future of the parish. The committee encourages this to happen in a range of ways:

- A bequest remembering the church in your estate through inclusion in your will or other means. It truly indicates that you care for our church in the same manner as you care for your family.
- Other planned gift alternatives such as a charitable gift annuity.
- As a beneficiary for a life insurance policy or other financial document that calls for the designation of a beneficiary.
- As a memorial when remembering someone when they have passed.
- As a gift alternative our own alternative giving is a good example. Think of giving to our church's endowment as a gift alternative.

<u>The 1684 Society</u> – we established our own legacy society – The 1684 Society – when we established the endowment and planned giving program fifteen years ago. Members of the 1684 Society know that they have looked beyond this life and made provision for the continuing financial support of their Christian community. The 1684 Society has been established by the Vestry of Middleham and St. Peter's Parish to recognize those persons who have made a documented planned gift to the Parish or to the Endowment Fund directly. Since the inception of the 1684 Society, 29 individuals and couples have made planned gifts to the church and endowment.

<u>September 15 events</u> – At the joint service on Sunday September 15, we will be pleased to welcome David and Brenda Hollweger and Pam Hawkins to the 1684 Society. We will also share more information about planned giving and the endowment and answer your questions. In the meantime, direct any questions to any members of the planned giving and endowment committee.

On Sunday, **September 29**, Middleham and St. Peter's will host an extraordinary opportunity for Southern Maryland- a **Townhall Meeting on the Future of Maryland's Education**. Specifically, the townhall is about the State Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education Report (The Kirwan Commission Report) which is approved 2019 legislation. Dr. William E. "Brit" Kirwan, chair of the Commission, will address the five policy initiatives in the report. Dr. David Hornbeck, former Maryland state superintendent of schools, will address what it will take to fund the new law. Dr. Kirwan and Dr Hornbeck are part of the **Strong Schools Maryland** initiative; an organization focused on the full passage and funding of the Kirwan Report.

What is this all about? Maryland is in the midst of a once in a generation opportunity to dramatically change its public education system from birth to college and career. Presently, Maryland's educational system ranks 26th among the states. Last January during the "Community Conversation on Dismantling Racism: Progress and Challenges in Our Schools", the Kirwan Report was raised numerous times. "Kirwan Commission Report" is the shorthand for The State Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education established by the State Legislature and Governor Hogan in 2016. The commission was charged with assessing what it would take to create a world-class education system. Its charge has two parts,

- (1) to examine policies, practices, and levels of resources necessary to ensure every student in Maryland has the opportunity to succeed and
- (2) to review and recommend any needed changes to update the current education funding formulas.

After almost three years of study, the Commission produced a bold report, that if fully implemented and funded, will transform Maryland's education from middle of the pack to world class. The first part of the Report was passed during 2019 State Legislative session. But to create this world class system, the Legislature and the counties must fully fund the law with adequate funding.

What is adequate funding? The work group defined adequate funding as "sufficient funds to acquire the total resources needed to reasonably expect that all students can meet the standards." Using this definition, Maryland schools were underfunded by \$2.9 billion annually from 2008 to 2017. Why are schools so underfunded? According to an Education Law Center study, Maryland ranks 11th for highest wealth, but 37th for how much of our wealth goes to school funding compared to other states. The Kirwan Commission will seek approval of the second part of the report during the 2020 Legislative session.

The purpose of the town hall is to better inform us on this important issue. Once again, Middleham and St. Peter's is leading the way as a "Center for the Community". Come out and bring your neighbor to hear for yourself, from the experts, about legislation that could greatly impact Maryland's educational and economic future for all.

Hidden Benefits Of Being An Acolyte



When you think of leadership in the church, what roles do you think of? Priests and deacons? Lay Chalicists? Church staff? Ministry leaders? And absolutely Acolytes! These young people, whose often unnoticed presence facilitates almost every service, embody true servant leadership.

 Acolytes are essential: Think of services where no acolytes are present. Much of the beauty and the glorious pageantry is missing. Processions without torches and crosses? Not as impactful.
 Furthermore, services without acolytes means clergy have less support when preparing Communion and facilitating worship.

2. Being acolytes allows young people to be active participants in worship: The acolytes I have spoken with echo this. They feel much more engaged in the worship service when they are playing an active role rather than sitting in the pews. Even young people who reported that their parents had at first "forced" them to acolyte, expressed a newfound connection to worship and an enthusiasm for being at church.

3. Acolyting is intergenerational: A young person who acolytes is more likely to feel a connection to adults serving in other worship-related ministries: clergy, altar guild members, greeters, ushers, lectors, lay eucharistic ministers, and choir members. Young people who connect to generations of adults

in the congregation – rather than only forming relationships with youth peers – are more likely to feel a deep connection to their church community. Faith formation is strengthened by these intergenerational relationships.

4. Acolyting is relational: Being acolytes helps young people form bonds with their peers, and with older and younger teens at church. Faith is meant to be practiced in community, and when a young person finds community for themselves, they are more likely to grow in faith. Young acolytes spoke proudly of having older teen friends who they knew through acolyte service; older teens spoke proudly of acting as role models to the younger teens on their acolyte teams.

5. Acolyting is a family affair: Many young people recalled that they began to acolyte as a way of emulating older siblings. Families are more likely to attend and be connected to a church community when their children serve at the altar.

6. Acolytes are invited to play with fire: Admit it, everybody likes to play with fire. But more importantly, when we trust young people with significant and potentially dangerous tasks, we show them that we see them as capable and competent. Inevitably they then live up to our expectations.

7. Acolyting makes a young person the center of attention: This surprised me. Many young people commented on how they enjoyed the feeling of having all eyes on them as they walked down the aisle with the cross. But isn't it supposed to be about God? Yes. So are we raising a generation of egomaniacs? I don't think so. Everyone's deepest desire is to be known, accepted, and loved. We want to have value in the eyes of others. Consider scripture and the many instances where Jesus paused to truly see and engage people who were otherwise invisible in society.Often our young people feel unseen and unimportant in our faith communities. Acolyting allows them to be seen, to be important, and to make a difference in our communal worship.

8. Acolyting makes young people nervous: When asked what they wished other people knew about being an acolyte, many young people said they wished others knew how seriously they take their role. They try very hard not to make mistakes, and when they do, it weighs heavily on them. Yet in talking about lessons learned as an acolyte, one young person told me the following: "Whatever I do, even if I'm not sure of what I'm doing, as long as I do it with confidence, it will be ok." Or as Julian of Norwich wrote, "All shall be well."

9. Acolyting is formational, and it teaches liturgy: In conversations replete with teenage slang, I also heard vocabulary that reflected a deep knowledge of liturgy and church tradition. In fact, one of the many reasons youth enjoyed being acolytes is that they learned more about the shape, structure, and flow of liturgy and worship traditions. Young people even mentioned some of their favorite services: Maundy Thursday and Good Friday – services often under-attended, especially by young people.

10. Acolytes are leaders: A component of good church leadership is being able to grow more fully into a ministerial role. The young people I spoke with reflected on their evolving acolyte responsibilities, and how moving from torch to crucifer or Lay Chalicist is "...a big leap." One crucifer explained how managing her acolyte team was an opportunity for her to demonstrate maturity and responsibility. Some young people spoke proudly of how being an acolyte encouraged them to seek out other roles in the church – as altar guild members, lay chalicists, vestry members, and more!

So Let There Be Acolytes!

Acolyting is an essential ministry, and one that imbues our worship with beauty, solemnity, and pageantry. Acolytes support both clergy and laity, ensuring that the behind-the-scenes tasks and logistics of worship flow smoothly.

Most importantly, our acolytes, whether they are 9 or 19 years old, are leaders in our communities, worthy of appreciation and respect. Next time you see a young person who is an acolyte, please compliment them and thank them for their ministry!

Looking back on the first school year

This was the first year of the project and a great deal was accomplished. The three schools were brought on board and are good partners, with infirmary space provided at each site. FSIL has committed excellent staff to serve as the nurses at the schools – Fabiola Rejouis and Yola Clervil initially, and now a third nurse Chardelyne Escarment. Reporting and program documentation systems were initiated. In December the Middleham team visited FSIL and had the opportunity to orient Fabiola and Yola to equipment and materials that we brought with us. Additional supplies and a refrigerator were transported from Maryland to Florida by Dale Yoe and her husband, and with the help of Dr. Colin sent by freighter to Haiti and on to FSIL. During the year, political turmoil in Haiti extended to Leogane and resulted in school closures for periods of time. Despite the challenges of starting up a new program and dealing with the turmoil in Haiti, nursing care, health assessments, health education, and vision testing were initiated for the students in the three schools. In fact, the program was made available to over 1500 elementary students, well beyond the 600 students expected during the planning stage for the project. Overall, it was a remarkable start.

During the Summer

The Middleham Haiti School Nurse team together with FSIL Dean Hilda Alcindor and FSIL Board Chair Jessie Colin are working on refinements and improvements going into the second year of the project, including:

- Refining the service design to make it more efficient
- A more specific plan and description for the involvement of the FSIL nursing students
- Plans for comprehensive hearing and vision testing and vaccinations for all who need it
- Obtaining more specific data on the need for and use of supplies and medications
- Developing the evaluation plan
- Refining the project budget to include a third year and specific sustainability plans. Our project
 has received a sustainability grant from the Diocese of Maryland. FSIL with our support will be
 working with the schools to scope out the manner in which the project will be sustained in the
 future.

"Hilda Alcindor, BA, RN, FAAN, was born and educated in Haiti. She graduated from the Ecole Nationale des Infirmieres (National School of Nursing) in Port-auPrince, Haiti, and shortly thereafter moved to the U.S. She served in the U.S. Air Force, and then worked nearly thirty years as a Registered Nurse.

Dean Alcindor received a BA in Health Services Administration from Union Institute in Miami, Florida. She also received a Certificate in Managing Quality Health Care Systems from Florida International University. Dean Alcindor has certifications in Quality Assurance/Discharge Planning/ Utilization Review; Case Management; CPR; Advanced Cardiac Life Support; and as an Educator. In 2014 Hilda was inducted as a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing, in Washington, DC.

Dean Alcindor has been active in the Haitian-American Nurses Association as a member and elected officer. She is also a member of the American Nurses Association and the Florida Nurses Association.

She has worked in several professional positions in the Miami area, including hospitals, home health, intensive care/ recovery room, emergency room, and as a school health educator. Her most recent position was as Admitting Nurse and Coordinator/ Relief Nursing Supervisor for the Mount Sinai Medical Center in Miami Beach.

Dean Alcindor is fluent in English, French, Spanish, and Creole. Appointed Dean (Doyenne) of FSIL in October, 2004, she has been instrumental in implementing the plans for FSIL and is a strong, dynamic leader of the FSIL School of Nursing."
